

Meet Pastor B

“We face hard things, but God still opens doors.”



Pastor B leads a house church in northern Laos. He and his wife have also taken in orphans and have helped Lao children who don't have the means to receive an education. He has been attending OTAN trainings since 2019, and he is becoming very skilled in the English language. Pastor B often helps with translating at OTAN trainings. These are his words:

“Hello. My name is ‘B.’ I am so glad to share a bit about myself and about how God called me and about the ministry that we are doing. I am married, and my wife and I have two kids. I became a Christian in 2002, and then God called me to go to Bible school. I finished Bible school and started ministry from 2012 until now.

“My family and I, we moved to a village to start a new house church there. We are taking care of some orphans and some poor students. They don't have any opportunity to go to school at their village, so we help them to stay with us and then go to school. We help them to grow in faith and love God more and more.

“About the ministry in my area: right now it seems like it is difficult for us to share the gospel. They (authorities) don't allow this, and they try to pressure us. They don't agree that we can share the gospel to the people. In the village where we live, they (previously) said they don't allow any Christians to live in that village. But we prayed for which place God would like us to live in, and then God answered our prayer through the Scripture. We know that God brought us to this village.

“Even though we face hard things, like when people don't agree that we should share the gospel, God still has opened the door in our area. Also now in one more village, four families have believed in Jesus! So we see how greatly our God has worked through us, even though it is hard.



*“I would like you to pray for our ministry. **Please pray that God will open more doors**, especially where I live in my village. We would like for many people to know Jesus Christ and to believe in Him. Also pray because now we see the work is growing, but we still lack the leaders to serve the church and to grow the ministry.*

“In the future, we want to have more leadership training to teach, to build more leaders, and to help us work together to spread and to share the gospel. This is the commandment of Jesus Christ and why He enabled us to go share the gospel and lead people to Him and teach them. This is why we commit to this OTAN training. Thank you very much!”
