

Preschool and English classes open doors

In 2022, Sayuri* was invited to an Easter outreach at Shimonoseki Christ Bible Church by the mother of a student at the New Beginning international preschool. Later, Sayuri enrolled her two children in the church's English conversation classes where Josh and Janae Hofer taught the children and developed a friendship with the family.

Last year, Marjorie, an assistant teacher at the preschool, also began spending time with Sayuri, who had many questions about the Bible. One day she asked Marjorie, "How can I know for sure that I can go to Heaven?" Marjorie shared God's plan of salvation with her and asked, "Would you like to pray to accept Christ as your Savior?" Sayuri said, "Yes!"

Sayuri began meeting with Pastor Tony for Bible studies. She told Tony, "I want my children to believe in Jesus too, but I don't know how to explain it." Tony helped her understand how to simply share the plan of salvation with her children. Over the next few weeks, she led both of her teenage children to the Lord. But her evangelistic efforts haven't stopped there!

She shared what was happening in her life with her mother, and that led to a meeting with Pastor Tony where Tony shared the gospel. The following Sunday, Sayuri and her mother attended church together, and Sayuri's mother accepted Jesus as her Savior. Now Sayuri's aunt has become curious about the changes in her family and wants to know more.

Recently, Sayuri became ill and was hospitalized. Would you pray for her, as well as for the new believers in her family? Pray that this trial will not discourage them but will draw them closer to Jesus.

LAHU GRADUATION CELEBRATION

Bible lessons and pastor training in Thailand



In January, OTAN director Al Doomy traveled to Thailand to participate in a graduation ceremony for the Lahu Living Word correspondence course.

Joshua Chan, our Thailand ministry manager, has developed a Bible correspondence course in the Lahu language. His wife, Samollay, is fluent in six languages and is a key ministry helper, translating much of the curriculum that is used.

"The course helps people of all walks of life to gain a clear understanding of the gospel and receive a solid foundation of basic Bible knowledge. Our traveling team meets regularly with students to answer questions and provide mentoring," Joshua says. "Seventy students completed the entire 10-book course in 2024, and 43 of those 70 were able to join us for the graduation ceremony!"

Joshua also runs the Biblical Leadership Training Center where pastors and leaders can gather to learn. He says, "Not only was Al Doomy able to come to the correspondence graduation, but he and OTAN's China ministry managers were able to join us for a week-long training of pastors and leaders."

"I taught an extensive course on the book of Luke," Al says, "and Dale gave an overview of the other gospels. Then we co-taught the book of Romans. The students had a lot questions, and we paused often to address them. Their interest was clearly evident, and their singing literally echoed throughout the valley."

Joshua adds, "Several students gave thanks to the Lord that they were able to grow in Bible knowledge, to see God transform their lives, and to be equipped to serve the Lord better. Our goal is to develop leaders for churches and communities who will live as disciples of Jesus and will help others do the same."

The Biblical Leadership Training Center is a critical part of training pastors from Thailand and from neighboring nations. Access to the facility is treacherous and almost impossible during the rainy season. About \$10,000 is needed to make the road passable. PASTORING IN CIVIL WAR

Support is needed for 3 Myanmar pastors

While the world is fixated on much-publicized wars in the Middle East and in Ukraine, most people remain unaware of the political situation in Myanmar. Formerly known as Burma, Myanmar was rocked by a military coup that took over the government in 2021. A *Time* magazine article from October of 2024 estimated that 50,000 people have lost their lives and that as many as 3 million have been displaced.

In this backdrop of war, critical shortages, and the prolonged closures of schools, OTAN's Myanmar ministry manager Dr. Thuam Khai has been hard at work. Traveling to the country several times a year, Dr. Khai, a Burmese national, is dedicated to providing education for children whose school systems have been shuttered—some for years. He is also training a group of pastors who are holding together a small network of churches in the country, including 3 pastors for which OTAN is hoping to raise support.

Pastor Lian has served in ministry for 12 years. He says, "Our family relocated due to the civil unrest in our area. I firmly believe in the Great Commission as the mandate for all Christians. Since the unrest began in 2021, my congregation and I have been in diaspora, seeking refuge from our village to safer locations amid the turmoil in our area."

Pastor Ngo led a church in Voklaak village for nearly 10 years, during which time he shared the gospel in nearby villages and led Bible seminars at about 30 small churches. "Since 2016 I have been involved with



another church, currently focusing on church planting missions in Khaikam Myo, Chin State," he says.

Pastor Noah began serving in ministry in 2009. He says, "In 2021, I returned to my hometown to care for my elderly parents and disabled sister. Currently, I am reaching out to public school teachers and serving over 20+ boarding students, many of whom are opening their hearts to Christ. Despite challenges, I am dedicated to this mission and seek your partnership in this endeavor."

These 3 men are bi-vocational, holding down full-time jobs while serving the needs of their churches and communities. Monthly support of \$125 for each of these pastors will allow them to have one day a week to fully dedicate their time to study and to serve their congregations.

Currently, we're looking for 2 Ministry Managers to serve the pastors of Laos and of eastern Russia. OTAN Ministry Managers live in the US, traveling to their country of service up to 3 times a year.

As a Ministry Manager, your duties would include:

- Raising the support needed to conduct ministry and to cover expenses
- Being responsible for the oversight and support of national pastors and leaders
- Managing and supervising training programs for nationals, including women

Maintaining regular contact with national workers through email, online meetings, etc.
